Purposes of Cub Scouting

The Boy Scouts of America began Cub Scouting as a program for younger boys more than 50 years ago. The purposes of Cub Scouting state that Parents, Leaders and Organizations work together to achieve the following:

1. Influence the development of character and encourage spiritual growth;
2. Develop habits and attitudes of good citizenship;
3. Encourage good sportsmanship and pride in growing strong in mind and body;
4. Improve understanding within the family;
5. Strengthen the ability to get along with and to respect others;
6. Foster a sense of personal achievement by developing new interests and skills;
7. Show how to be helpful and to do one's best;
8. Provide fun and exciting new things to do;
9. Prepare Cubs to become Boy Scouts.

Pack Structure

Like every effective organization, Cub Scout Packs have a structure. Understanding this structure and how it works will increase your son's enjoyment of the program (and leave the parent far less confused).

Dens

Groups of 8 to 10 boys meeting bi-weekly together as a DEN. Each den has a specific numeral attached to it, for example, your son may be in Den #9. Each DEN is led by a Den Leader **and** at least one Assistant Den Leader. A Boy Scout, known as a Den Chief, may also work with your son's DEN.

DENS are organized by school grade levels. We have one or more DENS for each group of 1st Graders (Tiger Cubs), 2nd Graders (Wolf), 3rd Graders (Bear), 4th Graders (Webelos I - 1st yr.) and 5th graders (Webelos II - 2nd yr.). Boys work toward a specific rank during each year in the PACK.

First Grade boys work toward their **Tiger Rank**

Second grade boys work toward their **Wolf Rank**

Third grade boys work toward their **Bear Rank**

Fourth grade boys are Webelos and work toward their **Webelos I Rank**

Fifth grade boys are **Webelos II** and work on Cub Scouting's highest award, the *Arrow of Light*

The **Den Leaders** are the ones who do the majority of the work, and who have the most fun. All adult leaders must take Youth Protection Training which can be found online at www.olc.scouting.org. Den Leaders plan and organize DEN meetings, keep track of the boys' advancements, and attend Committee meetings. Den Leaders should try to engage the parents in the den meetings to the greatest extent possible, both to make the Den Leader's job easier and to increase the boys' enjoyment. Cub Scouting is a family activity, and DEN meetings are a great place for family involvement. The Den Leader can go to the Cubmaster or the Committee Chair for advice and assistance.

Pack

The PACK consists of the DENS and their Families. The PACK serves as a "parent" organization to the DENS and provides direction, program support and maintenance of the budget. The PACK is led by the Cubmaster. He/she plans and directs monthly Pack Meetings and other special activities and events.

The **Cubmaster** is in charge of the Pack Meetings and reports to the Committee. In some PACKs the Cubmaster is only the MC for the meetings, in others the Cubmaster plays a major organizational role. In either case, the boys see the Cubmaster as the authority figure.

PACK 374 is in the Trail of Tears District, which is in the Middle TN Council. As Cub Scouts we are members of the national organization, Boy Scouts of America.

Committee

The PACK is run by the Pack Committee, which is headed by the Committee Chairman. Other committee positions include Cubmaster, Secretary, Treasurer, Event Coordinators and Award/Achievement Coordinators. In Pack 374, all adult leaders are Committee Members, although only one Den Leader is asked to attend the monthly meetings. Along with the Cubmaster, the Committee Chair leads the group in planning and organizing the PACK program. The Committee meets once each month to plan Pack Meetings and other PACK activities. The Committee is also responsible for maintaining PACK funds and planning its budget. A copy of the budget is available for interested parents. The Pack 374 Committee meets the first Monday of the month at 6:30pm at BUMC, see the PACK calendar for dates, some months may vary. Parents may become Registered Committee Members. Parents are also encouraged to volunteer to serve on the committee and are welcome to attend regular meetings. *A Library of Information with Handbooks, brochures, patch information, etc. is available to Den Leaders and Parents for check out, please see Pack Secretary for more information.

Blackman United Methodist Church

Every Cub Scout PACK must have a Chartered Organization that acts as a "sponsor". Pack 374's sponsor is Blackman United Methodist Church located at 4380 Mason Pike in Murfreesboro, TN. BUMC has been a most generous sponsor since our PACK was formed. BUMC continues to provide us with a meeting place and they also continuously give support to our PACK and the Cub Scout Program.

Meetings and Special Events

Den Meetings

Each DEN will meet weekly or bi-weekly. The specific day, time and location is up to each individual DEN. This day, time and location usually remain the same throughout the year. DEN meetings are not usually held during holiday periods.

To ensure that your scout gets the most out of his DEN meeting, please follow this list of helpful hints:

- ◆ Please have your scout to DEN meetings **on time**. *Parents are always welcome and encouraged to stay with their scout for DEN meetings.
- ◆ Please be sure that your scout **is prepared** for the DEN meeting – he should wear his scout uniform, have his handbook and any additional items the Den Leader has requested him to bring.
- ◆ Please pay your DEN **dues promptly**. Dues help the den to purchase needed items for projects or activities, supplies, snacks, etc. *Not all DENs will collect dues, this is at the discretion of the Den Leader.
- ◆ Please **pick up** your son from DEN meetings **on time**. *Tigers must have a Parent Partner with them at all meetings/events.
- ◆ Be an **active parent**. If your Den Leader asks you to lead or help with an activity, jump in! One example is: Parents can take turns “sponsoring” a belt loop.

Pack Meetings

Pack Meetings are held the third Monday of the month. Pack meetings are for all the boys of Pack 374. We expect a parent or the whole family to attend the Pack Meeting. When not announced differently, Pack Meetings are at BUMC and begin at 6:30pm. Please arrive early so the meeting can start on time.

At Pack Meetings, scouts are presented with progress beads, belt loops and other badges and awards they have earned as they work towards their rank badge. *Rank badges are usually received at the Blue and Gold Banquet held each year in February.* Also, at Pack Meetings, a selected DEN will be asked to share a skit, song, or display a special craft. There may also be a drawing, an advancement ceremony or other theme event that will take place at a Pack Meeting. Families are encouraged to attend the Pack Meetings with their scout; this is an opportunity to see your scout SHINE! Pack 374 strives to make our Pack Meetings entertaining, enriching and FUN!

Please observe the following guidelines in regards to Pack Meetings:

- ◆ Please **accompany your son** to Pack Meetings. The whole Family is welcome!
- ◆ Please **arrive on time** to Pack Meetings.
- ◆ Please be sure to **sign in** when you arrive and **pay all fees and dues** at this time.
- ◆ Please have your scout wear his **Class A Uniform**.

Blue and Gold Banquet

The Blue and Gold Banquet is held in February each year. This banquet marks the “birthday of scouting”. This is a formal event for Pack 374 in that there will be a special dinner followed by a special Awards Ceremony. It is at this banquet that the scouts receive their Rank Badge (if they have completed the necessary requirements). This event is for the entire family, including parents, siblings, grandparents, etc.

Raingutter Regatta

The Raingutter Regatta is a boat race. Each scout and scout sibling will have the opportunity to race his boat by blowing on the mast to make it flow down the gutter. This event is usually held in lieu of the November Pack Meeting.

Pinewood Derby

The Pinewood Derby is a car race. Each scout, scout sibling and leader/parent may enter a car to be raced in the PWD. This event is held in March. The winners at this level will get the chance to race their car again at the District PWD.

Ranks and Advancement

Boys work their way through Cub Scouts doing activities that are fun and challenging. The activities are carefully chosen to be age-appropriate and emphasize learning by doing. They cover many aspects of life, and are designed to:

- Influence a boy's character development and spiritual growth.
- Develop habits and attitudes of good citizenship.
- Encourage good sportsmanship and pride in growing strong in mind and body.
- Improve understanding within the family.
- Strengthen a boy's ability to get along with others.
- Foster a sense of personal achievement by developing new interests and skills.
- Show a boy how to be helpful and do his best.
- Provide fun and exciting new things to do.

In addition to the activities that contribute to advancement in rank, the boys can earn belt loops, pins and letters in the optional Sports and Academic Program. The purpose of these awards is to encourage Scouts to try new activities and learn new skills, or to improve those skills they already have. As in most activities in Cub Scouting, this is not meant to be a highly competitive program; instead the boys are encouraged to "do their best".

Bobcat Rank



All Cub Scouts begin advancement by earning the **Bobcat Badge**. After earning the Bobcat Badge, they proceed to work on advancement specific to their age level. As part of the Bobcat Badge requirements, they must learn the **Cub Scout Promise**, the **Law of the Pack**, and the **Cub Scout Motto**.

Tiger Rank



Cub Scouts joining as first grade boys enter the **Tiger Cub Program**. Tiger Cub Dens meet one or two times a month in addition to being welcome at all Pack Meetings. Tiger Cubs BSA introduces boys and their adult partners to the excitement of Cub Scouting as they "Search, Discover, and Share" together. The Tiger Cub program is meant to be simple and **fun**. Pack 374 welcomes its Tiger Cubs to all PACK activities.

Wolf Rank



In the second grade, Cub Scouts work toward the **Wolf Badge**, then toward a **Gold Arrow Point** and **one or more Silver Arrow Points**. The requirements for these badges are found in the Wolf Cub Scout Handbook. Boys working towards their Wolf Badge are called Wolf Cubs.

Bear Rank



In the third grade, Cub Scouts are called Bear Cubs and work toward the **Bear Badge**, after which they work toward earning a **Gold Arrow Point** and **Silver Arrow Points**. The requirements for these badges are found in the Bear Cub Scout Handbook.

Webelos Rank



The Webelos Program is a two-year program for fourth and fifth grade boys. In both years, they work toward earning **Webelos Activity Pins** in twenty different areas, arranged in five groups, and toward one of two different cloth Badges. Fourth grade boys work toward the **Webelos Badge**. After earning the Webelos Badge, boys work toward **Compass Point Emblem** and **Metal Compass Points** by earning additional Activity Pins. Fifth graders, after earning the Webelos Badge, earn the **Arrow of Light**. The Arrow of Light is the highest rank in Cub Scouts, and is the only Cub Scout Badge that may be worn on a Boy Scout uniform.

As each Scout works toward their rank they will wear different totems to show their progress. Tiger Cubs wear a **Tiger Paw Totem** with a white bead for each required family activity, an orange bead for each required den activity and a black bead for each required *Go See It* he completes. Wolves and Bears wear a **Progress Toward Rank Totem** with a bead signifying 3 achievements completed toward the rank. Webelos earn Activity Pins for their Webelos Badge and for the Arrow of Light. These are worn on a special totem called the **Webelos Colors** on the right sleeve of their uniform. After a Tiger, Wolf or Bear Cub has earned his rank, he can work on special activities called electives. Tigers earn yellow beads for their totem by earning electives, while Wolves and Bears earn **Arrow Points**. When a Wolf or Bear has completed 10 electives, he gets a Gold Arrow Point. When he has completed a second set of 10 electives, he receives a Silver Arrow Point, and he can earn as many Silver Arrow Points as he is able. Webelos do not have Arrow Points, but if they earn 7 Activity Pins, they receive the Compass Point Emblem and for each 4 Activity Pins they earn after that they receive a Compass Point to attach to their Compass Point Emblem.

Any Wolf, Bear or Webelos Scout can earn the Cub Scout World Conservation Award and/or the Religious Award. Each Scout FAMILY can also earn the BSA Family Award.

Throughout the year, there will be many other opportunities for your scout to earn additional badges. A few examples are Popcorn Sales, Recruiting, Good Turn, Leave No Trace, etc. More information about these opportunities will be announced at the preceding Pack Meeting and also on the PACK website at www.pack374.net. You may also find information about these badges and others in the Pack Library. See the Pack Secretary at Pack Meetings.

The PACK will provide all Rank Badges, Arrow Points, Tiger/Wolf/Bear Totems, Webelos Activity Pins, Compass Emblem and Points, Arrow of Light and several other BSA awards. Items such as Sports and Academic Belt Loops and Pins are not provided by the PACK. It is at the Den Leader's discretion how these items will be paid for, either by the parent or with Den dues.

Parent Responsibilities

Parents play an important role in the PACK. The leaders will do their best to provide a quality program, but all the leaders in Pack 374 are volunteers and have many other obligations. We depend on parents to help provide the good program we have. We ask every parent to help the PACK in some capacity. You should help with at least one PACK activity a year (e.g. Pinewood Derby or a campout). A parent should also attend the Pack Meetings together with their scout. Every scout handbook has a parent guide at the beginning; it's a good idea to read this. We also have a child protection videotape which you can watch together with your scout. There are no secrets in Cub Scouts; parents are always welcome in any organizational meetings of the Pack, District or Council.

When joining Pack 374, each parent or adult family member agrees to support their scout in the following ways:

- ✦ See that he has the proper uniform and handbook;
- ✦ Assist him in attending weekly Den Meetings and monthly Pack meetings;
- ✦ Work with him to complete achievements for his rank award;
- ✦ Return information forms, dues and permission slips as asked;
- ✦ Support his Den Leader as a resource person or substitute as asked;
- ✦ Agree to serve in some leadership capacity as called upon;
- ✦ Provide input to the Den Leader or Pack leadership with regard to Pack or Den programming.

Fees and Paperwork

Registration

The annual dues are \$30 and \$15 for a second boy. This includes a subscription to Boys Life; one per family. The registration fee for adult leaders is \$10. Dues are collected in August at the Back To Pack Swim Party for the upcoming year, which is from December to December. For Newcomers to the PACK, a prorated fee is collected. New scouts usually pay the prorated fee at registration and then the annual fee in October. This annual fee must be collected from every registered scout and adult leader for the annual re-chartering of the PACK.

Annual dues go towards the cost of the yearly membership to BSA, for the insurance issued to cover the boys and adult leaders at all scout functions, a subscription to Boy's Life magazine, the many awards that will be presented to each scout throughout the year and the various other costs to maintain the PACK.

Pack 374 maintains its own bank account at Fifth Third Bank, with records kept by a Pack Treasurer.

Annual Fundraiser

Pack 374 only participates in ONE fundraiser per year – Popcorn Sales. All profits go to benefit the Scout, the Pack and the Middle TN Council. Whatever money the PACK keeps goes toward the benefit of the PACK, for such events as picnics, camp-outs, other outings or needed supplies. Each scout who sells over \$100 will receive 10%, or over \$300 will receive 15%, back in PACK dollars to spend on PACK events. As always, we try to emphasize the FUN in *fundraising*!

Health Forms

Each scout will need to have a current Health Form on file with the Committee Chair. Health forms will need to be updated as necessary and verified each year when Registration Dues are paid.

Uniforms

The Cub Scout uniform gives your son group identity and a place to display his award patches. Tiger, Wolves and Bears wear the BLUE Cub Scout shirt. Webelos may wear either the BLUE or TAN shirt. When purchasing your scout's shirt, remember that your scout is growing and plan accordingly. Neckerchiefs are provided by the PACK at end of the year graduation for the following year. New scouts will need to provide their own first neckerchief. Pack 374 requires scouts and leaders to wear their uniform from the waist up. Your son may wear jeans or shorts instead of the official uniform pant. Pack 374 also has a Class B PACK T-shirt that will be available. **Scouts who participate in the Popcom Sale, will receive a FREE T-shirt.** Class B's can be worn for certain "messy" outdoor activities or Den meetings.

There are several patches that will need to be affixed to your scout's uniform. Placement instructions can be found in your Cub Scout *Rank Handbook* and in this Parent Handbook. It is very IMPORTANT that patches are affixed properly. Uniform inspections will take place randomly during Den Meetings and Pack Meetings. Please contact the PACK Secretary for contact information about getting patches sewn on, if you don't wish to do it yourself.

As with any other uniform, it is very important that your scout wear his uniform with pride. He should be sure that his shirt is tucked in, he has a belt on, his hair is properly brushed or that his hat is worn appropriately, his hands and face should be clean and his shoes should also be worn appropriately (i.e. laces are tied, etc.)

Uniforms, patches and accessories are available at the Murfreesboro Scout Shop located inside Haynes Hardware located at 1807 Memorial Blvd. The Murfreesboro Scout Shop is open Mon. - Fri. from 1:00pm - 6:00pm and Sat. from 11:00am - 3:00pm, the phone number is 867-4690. There is also a Middle TN Council Scout Shop in Nashville, they carry everything that can be found in the Scout Catalog and then some!

The following is a list of items that are required for Pack 374; unchecked items are optional:

- *Tiger (orange), Wolf (yellow) or Bear (blue) Cub Scout Neckerchief and Cub Scout Slide
- Cub Scout Web Belt and Buckle (this belt is designed to fit the Belt Loop awards that scouts can earn)
- Official Tiger, Wolf or Bear Cap
- Official Cub Scout Shorts/Pants
- Official Tiger (orange stripe) or Cub Scout (yellow stripe) Socks

* Cub Scout Neckerchief is provided by the PACK after one year of service, it is awarded at pack graduation in May for the next rank.

Webelos

- Webelos Handbook
- BLUE or TAN Scout Shirt with U.S. Flag (if your son is joining in 4th or 5th grade, it is best to purchase the TAN shirt)
- Middle TN Council Patch
- Pack 374 Numeral Patches (red with white numbers)
- Your scout's Den Number Strip or Patrol Patch
- World Crest Emblem Patch (round, purple patch with the fleur-de-lis symbol)
- *Checkered Webelos Neckerchief and Webelos Slide
- BLUE Shoulder Loops for the TAN shirt
- Cub Scout Web Belt and Webelos Buckle (this belt is designed to fit the Belt Loop awards that scouts can earn)
- Official Webelos Cap
- Official Boy Scout Socks to match shirt
- Official Boy Scout Shorts/Pants
- **Webelos Colors Activity Badge Pins may be worn on the Webelos Hat or the Webelos Colors

* Webelos Neckerchief is provided by the PACK after one year of service, it is awarded at pack graduation in May for the next rank.

**This option is decided at the Den level. Please check with your Den Leader to see if this is required for your DEN.

Shirt Insignia Placement

Sleeves

Shirt comes with US flag pre-sewn on right sleeve. Add BSA blue shoulder loops for the Tan uniform.



Den Number (right sleeve)

This patch should be placed centered below and touching the flag patch.

Quality Unit Award (right sleeve)

If worn, this patch should be centered below the flag patch, with the top of the Quality Unit Award located four inches (4") below the shoulder seam.

Only one Quality Unit Award may be worn on the uniform at a time.

CSP (left sleeve)

The Council Shoulder Patch should be centered on the sleeve, touching the shoulder seam.

Veteran Unit Bar (left sleeve)

When worn, should be centered below and touching the CSP; these bars are available for 25, 50, 55 or 60 years.

Unit Number (left sleeve)

Worn centered below and touching the CSP (or Veteran Unit Bar, if worn); if more than one patch is required for the unit number, those patches should not have spaces between them.

Denner/Assistant Denner Cords (left sleeve)

These cords are worn over the left shoulder and are presented by the Den Leader.

Webelos Scout Options (right sleeve)



Patrol Patch

Optionally, the Webelos Scout may wear a patrol patch in place of the den number patch. If this is done, the patch should be placed centered below and touching the flag patch.

Webelos Colors

The Webelos colors may also be worn on the right sleeve, either attached immediately below the flag or, if worn, immediately below the den number or patrol emblem. If the colors are worn, any activity pin(s) the Scout has earned should be attached to them.

Right Pocket



National Summertime Award

If worn, this pin should be placed centered on the pocket flap above the button.

Temporary Insignia

An example is a Good Turn Patch, Leave No Trace or Day Camp Patch.

Not necessary for uniform inspections, but if worn should be centered on the pocket.

Recruiter Strip

When worn, center immediately below and touching the bottom of the pocket. **Please note that the picture is not exact, it shows a Tiger strip that is no longer used.*

Tiger Cub Option



Tiger Cubs Immediate Recognition Kit

When worn, attached to the button of the right pocket, with the flap buttoned.

Wolf/Bear Cub Option



Progress Towards Ranks

When worn, attached to the button of the right pocket, with the flap buttoned.

Webelos Scout Option



Compass Points Emblem

When worn, attached to the button of the right pocket, with the flap buttoned.

Left Pocket

World Crest

Worn centered between the left shoulder seam and the top of the left pocket.

Medals or Knots

Worn centered above the left pocket, touching the top of the pocket flap. The order in which these awards are worn is at the wearer's discretion and a maximum of five medals may be worn at a time. Please note that the only knots that may be worn by a Cub Scout are the religious emblem, lifesaving and meritorious award knots.

Service Stars

Worn centered above the left pocket, either 3/8" above the left pocket or immediately above any medals or knots. Cub Scouts use gold background disks behind their service stars, including Tiger Cub service.

Rank Badges

Cub Scouts wear the ranks, which they have earned, including Tiger, Bobcat, Wolf and Bear. Webelos wear only their current badge of rank (Bobcat, Wolf, Bear or Webelos) centered on the pocket; for exceptions to this, see below.

Arrow Points

Gold Arrow Points are worn beneath the pocket and are centered below the rank for which they were earned. Silver Arrow Points are worn in double rows below their respective Gold Arrow Points.



Webelos Scout Options



Webelos Scouts Without Tiger Rank (blue shirt)

Webelos Scouts who have not earned the Tiger rank may wear all other ranks on their uniform as depicted above.



Webelos Scouts Without Tiger Rank (tan shirt)

Webelos Scouts who have not earned the Tiger rank may wear all other ranks on their uniform as depicted at the left. Note that a temporary rank holder is available for displaying these ranks; this avoids sewing the rank patches on the tan shirt, which may cause an unwanted appearance to the shirt when the boy wears the uniform with the oval patches for Webelos or, later, Boy Scout ranks.



Oval Webelos Scouts Rank Patch (tan shirt)

Webelos Scouts may elect to wear the oval Webelos Scout rank patch in place of the diamond shaped patch. When this option is selected, no other Cub Scout rank patches are worn on the uniform. This is the option used by Pack 374

Arrow of Light

Typically worn on the tan shirt; this award is worn centered below the pocket.
